WHY MIDTOWN PARKS?

MISSION

Midtown Parks, the 501(c)(3) arm of Midtown Association, aims to increase health and community engagement by investing in Midtown's parks and public spaces.

VISION

Parks and open spaces encourage active lifestyles and promote social interaction, which are essential components of enhancing physical and mental health. Midtown Parks aims to transform Midtown's open spaces into dynamic destinations that attract diverse community members and enhance community value. We believe investments that create incredible and active parks in Midtown improve our community's health and quality of life.

WHAT INSPIRES OUR PARKS

Incredible cities boast incredible parks. These parks are massive in scale, like Golden Gate Park in San Francisco, or small pockets of aspirational green space, like the High Line in New York City. These parks quickly become the backyards, gyms, cafes, playgrounds, and community gathering spaces of urban dwellers.

"Healthy and active parks reduce stress, improve mental health, and increase activity. Having six healthy parks in our urban core increases the quality of life for our residents and employees tremendously. After seeing the catalytic effect that Brooklyn Bridge Park has had on its surrounding neighborhoods in New York, I am confident that Midtown Parks can create a network of inclusive public spaces that benefit our community."



THE AREA WE SERVE

Midtown Parks' centrally-located parks provide a welcome escape from urban life, offering recreation that improves mental and physical well-being. Enhanced facilities and programming can yield even greater benefits to our residents and visitors. Analysis of economic impacts of similar organizations has demonstrated the ability to increase housing supply, raise property values in the nearby vicinity, and attract investment to the central city.





Home to everything from concerts, chalk festivals, artisan markets and chess matches, Fremont Park is surrounded by restaurants, coffee shops and high-density housing creating a lively urban oasis in Midtown.

FREMONT PARK



Located near Midtown Sutter's dining and nightlife and the home of the Hart Senior Center, Marshall Park caters to young adults, seniors, families, and the broader community alike. The 2.5-acre green space offers a cool escape with ample shade from trees, hosts fitness classes, and is home to our annual community favorite event: The Midtown Halloween Festival and Pooch Parade.

MARSHALL PARK



Conveniently located near Washington Elementary School and 16th Street's dining and shopping, Muir Park is a 2.5-acre park in Midtown with a variety of amenities including a playground, a vibrant mural-adorned basketball court, soccer field, picnic tables and more. The park also hosts fitness classes and Midtown Second Saturday events.

MUIR PARK



As the only state park on the list and with a perimeter covering six block faces, Sutter's Fort is the largest park in the Midtown Parks service area. Sutter's Fort includes the fort itself, the California State Indian Museum, decomposed granite walking paths, and six acres of open green space.

SUTTER'S FORT



Midtown's dedicated dog park, Truitt Bark Park, features separate fenced-in parks for both small and large dogs and is busy with four-legged visitors from sunrise to sunset. It is marked by an iconic sculpture spelling out the letters "BARK" and a mural of local dogs.

TRUITT BARK PARK



Adjacent to Washington Elementary School, Washington Park is a 1.56-acre neighborhood park featuring an adventure play area, shaded picnic space, and shade structure, making it an ideal spot for families and nearby residents to relax, play, and gather.

WASHINGTON PARK



Conveniently located near housing, a Light Rail station and the Sacramento Natural Foods Co-op grocery store, Winn Park is a picturesque park in Midtown famous for its iconic trees. Recently installed ambient string lights connect six of the major trees in the park. The park is a popular spot for picnics and outdoor gatherings and hosts events like markets, fitness classes, and cultural festivals.

WHAT WE'VE ACCOMPLISHED

Since 2019, Midtown Parks has been dedicated to enriching the community by transforming local green spaces into vibrant, engaging hubs. Through innovative programming, strategic partnerships, and a commitment to advocacy on behalf of Midtown's public spaces, Midtown Parks has worked tirelessly to foster a sense of community and enhance the quality of life for residents and visitors alike.



SUTTER'S FORT MOVIE NIGHT

From 2019-2021, free outdoor movie nights at Sutter's Fort, hosted by Midtown Parks, averaged 100 attendees per night and continued during the pandemic with socially distanced seating.



SHADE STRUCTURES

In 2019, in collaboration with Capitol Area Development Authority (CADA), Sutter Health, and the City of Sacramento, Midtown Parks installed seven all-weather umbrellas at Truitt Bark Park, offering year-round protection for visitors and their dogs.

HALLOWEEN FESTIVAL & POOCH PARADE

First launched over a decade ago, Midtown's Halloween Festival & Pooch Parade now draws 250 costumed dogs and 700 attendees to Marshall Park for a family-friendly parade of pups in Halloween costumes.



FRESH AIR: MIDTOWN PARKS

Launched in 2019, Fresh Air: Midtown Parks offers free wellness activities like yoga and Pilates across five Midtown parks, attracting nearly 10K participants each season from May to September.

WEDNESDAYS AT WINN

Launched in 2020, Wednesdays at Winn Night Market ran year-round for three years, featuring 20 vendors and attracting 500 weekly attendees to Winn Park, sponsored by Midtown Parks.



UTILITY ART BOX WRAPS

In 2021, Midtown Parks collaborated on art wraps for electrical boxes at Fremont and Winn Parks, featuring designs by local artists Melissa Uroff and Brandon Gastinell.

FREE WIFI

Through advocacy efforts with elected officials, Wi-Fi was installed at Fremont and Truitt Bark Parks from 2019-2020, as part of Sacramento's public-private partnership with Verizon, enhancing digital access and community engagement.

5K CHALLENGE

The Midtown Parks 5K Challenge, introduced in 2020, encouraged outdoor activity during the pandemic with a route through Midtown parks and exercise stations.



LIGHT POLE BANNERS

Through the installation of light pole banners at Winn Park in 2020 and Fremont Park in 2022, a new tool for sharing information, such as free fitness class scheduling, was made available to the community.

WHAT WE'VE ACCOMPLISHED

SUTTER'S FORT AND WINN PARK LIGHTING

In 2022, Midtown Parks, California State Parks, Sutter Health, SMUD, and Hume Developments installed 109 lights around Sutter's Fort and added 650 feet of string lighting at Winn Park, enhancing safety and ambiance funded by City ARPA funds.



WAYFINDING POSTS

In 2023, with support from the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) and SAFE Credit Union, 24 wayfinding posts were installed across all six parks. Each post included a QR code linking to an interactive website of walking/biking distances between Midtown landmarks.

MUIR PARK ART

In 2022, Midtown Parks, with support from Sutter Health and the Sacramento Region Community Foundation, installed a vibrant mural and vinylwrapped backboards at Muir Park's basketball court honoring the Royal Chicano Air Force art collective's cultural influence.

WINN PARK HISTORIC BUILDING RENNOVATION

Midtown Parks supported city efforts to upgrade the historic structure at Winn Park to house a future cultural center that complements and activates the park space for DEI initiatives.



UPDATED TRUITT BARK PARK ART

In 2023, with support from CADA and Sutter Health, the Truitt Bark Park "BARK" letters were refreshed by Uli Smith and a new mural was installed by John Horton featuring eight local dogs.

TRUITT BARK PARK COFFEE CART

In October 2024, Late Mouse Coffee was brought in to activate Truitt Bark Park on peak weekend hours with a small coffee service cart to encourage longer-lasting visits.



FREMONT PARK BATHROOMS

Supported the installation of a new bathroom building at Fremont Park

THE COURT AT 18L

Through collaboration with SKK Developments and Street FC, Midtown Parks helped designate an empty lot as a public park for construction of Midtown's first and only street soccer court in September 2024.

WHAT'S NEXT

As we look ahead, Midtown Parks remains committed to reimagining public spaces that reflect the vibrant spirit of our community. Building on our past successes, we will introduce expanded amenities, inclusive programming, and sustainable enhancements that deepen connections among residents and visitors.



MARSHALL PARK PLAN

With input from area stakeholders, Midtown Parks created a plan to revamp Marshall Park with a list of priority items to be installed in the coming years. When completed, the park will feature landscape improvements, ambient lighting, public art, electrical upgrades and an outdoor stage. Additionally, street furnishings and mobility infrastructure such as benches, bike racks and designated micromobility parking may be added in a second phase of the plan.



FRIENDS OF SUTTER'S FORT PARTNERSHIP

The Friends of Sutter's Fort 501(c)(3) aims to preserve historic structures, provide educational experiences for 50K students annually, and fund restoration, staffing, and community events to enhance Sutter's Fort. Through a continued partnership with California State Parks, Midtown Parks will support Friends of Sutter's Fort's mission through collaboration of operations and activities.



FREMONT PARK BLOOM

In partnership with CADA, the Fremont Park Bloom project aims to introduce a vibrant seasonal illuminated poppy sculptures throughout the park to draw in visitors. Local design firm Atlas Lab has been recruited to undertake the design piece of the project which is aimed at building upon Fremont Park's success by bringing the park to life with a stunning bloom each spring, starting in 2026.



ACTIVATING WASHINGTON PARK

Starting in 2026, Washington Park near the 16th Street corridor will fall under the Midtown Parks umbrella and begin receiving investments such as landscaping and infrastructure improvements, as well as expanded programming through Fresh Air: Midtown Parks.



SUTTER'S FORT LIGHTING PHASE 2

After a successful collaboration with California State Parks, Sutter Health, SMUD, and Hume Development to install lighting around the exterior perimeter of Sutter's Fort, a second phase of investment would bring additional lighting to the park's walkways and on-site museum, currently known as The State Indian Museum. This lighting would further increase the safety and ambiance of the historic park and allow for increased opportunities for nighttime programming.



PARAGARY PATHWAY

Paragary Pathway, honoring the legacy and lasting influence of renowned restauranter Randy Paragary, aims to enhance 30 block faces through the installation of ambient LED lighting in trees located along 28th and 29th Streets from J Street to O Street. This public lighting investment will create vibrancy and increase safety throughout Midtown, including near Marshall Park.



"Outdoor spaces are vital to the health and happiness of our families and communities. In dynamic neighborhoods like Midtown, they provide places for children to play, families to bond and neighbors to come together. These parks are the heart of our communities and I'm proud to support efforts that prioritize access to these essential spaces, ensuring they remain a cornerstone of family life in our district."

The second, GivingTuesday, follows Black Friday, Small Business Saturday, and Cyber Monday, as part of a global campaign encouraging financial support for nonprofits during their end-of-year campaigns.

INCOME DETAIL

The largest portion of Midtown Parks' 2026 income will come by way of deferred revenue from private contributions made for the Paragary Pathway lighting installation. Midtown Parks' annual fundraising event, Midtown Love, is supported through sponsorships and event revenue from ticket sales and raffle entries. Additional contributions come primarily through fundraising campaigns such as Big Day of Giving and GivingTuesday. In 2026, income from Friends of Sutter's Fort will come by way of charged administration fees and income from operations of on-site store at Sutter's Fort.

EXPENSE DETAIL

Placemaking expenses are related to delivering key activations such as Fresh Air: Midtown Parks, capital improvements such as infrastructure investments and pilot projects such as the Fremont Bloom. Communications expenses include promotions and public relations, staffing and website maintenance and hosting. Cost of Goods Sold are tied to the operations of the on-site store at Sutter's Fort.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION

A three percent reserve goal is recommended.

CAPITAL PURCHASES

Equipment for parks programming may be purchased as needed.
